Course Description

This course is an introduction to inter- and cross-disciplinary research. It creates opportunities to inquire and to think out-of-the box. You will learn what research is and what is not, how to review the literature relevant to your research/creative activity project, to differentiate among various research types, and the approaches/methodology your fellow undergraduate researchers, who are in the EURECA program use to answer the questions proposed in their research projects. You will have the opportunity to share your research/creative activity with EURECA mentors and your fellow researchers.

Course Objectives/Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- To identify what research is and what is not.
- To describe the essential components of the research process.
- To use databases to find relevant primary and secondary sources of information.
- Differentiate among the various research types and creative activities.
- Differentiate among the various methodologies used in research.
- To recognize and practice the conditions that lead to creative thinking and discovery
- To apply critical thinking, deductive and inductive reasoning to solve problems, answer questions and to create and discover.
- To conduct research ethically and recognize discipline-specific ethical issues.
- To write a research/creative work proposal to answer a question.

Course Delivery Method and Attendance Policy

This course is delivered via face-to-face at the university campus, and online through D2L. Course materials and access to an online management system will be made available to each student. Each student is expected to be familiar with this program as it provides a primary source of communication regarding assignments, examination materials, and general course information. You can log into D2L through the MSU Homepage. If you experience difficulties, please contact the technicians listed for the program or contact your instructor.

Face-to-Face Instruction

Required Face-to-Face meetings will occur on Fridays from 12:00-12:50 pm. Students must engage in class activities during this time. To be prepared, students must complete the asynchronous online activities prior to attending class.

Asynchronous Online Instruction

Aynchronous online instruction occurs anytime before and after our face-to-face meeting on Fridays from 12:00-12:50 pm. Students watch lectures, read assigned materials, inspect websites, answer and write questions, discuss readings and engage in learning activities in a virtual environment prior to attending the face-to-face session.

Course materials are organized into weekly modules. Modules contain objectives to be accomplished, tasks to complete in order to accomplish the objectives, assessment activities and expected outcomes. Your success in this course depends on how well you engage in your own learning. Those in virtual only will be expected to submit weekly activities for engagement to the D2L dropbox.

A seating chart, assigned seating, and attendance checks will be used for all face to face classes. Attendance is expected at all class meetings and you are expected to be on time when class begins. Leaving class early without prior permission will result in your being counted absent for the class session. Students and faculty will not attend/hold class if they are experiencing illness or any signs/symptoms of COVID-19.

A tentative course schedule has been posted on D2L. All course content, assignments, and due dates have been outlined.

Students are expected to be on time and in attendance at <u>every</u> class, and to stay for the <u>entire</u> class. A student with excessive absences may be dropped from the course (<u>Student Handbook 2020-2021</u>, p. 61).

An instructor may drop a student any time during the semester for excessive absences, for consistently failing to meet class assignments, for an indifferent attitude, or for disruptive conduct. The instructor must give the student a verbal or written warning prior to dropping the student from the class. An instructor's drop of a student takes precedence over the student-initiated course drop of a later date. The instructor will assign a grade of either WF or F through the first 8 weeks of a long semester, the first 6 weeks of a 10-week summer term, or the 11th class day of a 4 or 5 week summer term consisting of 20 days. After these periods the grade will be an F. The date the instructor drop form is received in the Office of the Registrar is the official drop date.

If you would like to receive notifications via a regularly checked email or via text message, you can set it up in D2L. Once you are logged in, go to the drop down by your name in the gold navigation bar. Click "notifications", then you can register an email address or mobile number and customize which notifications you would like to receive.

Assignment Overview and Grading Criteria

Due dates will be shared in D2L and in the schedule. Any assignment can be submitted before the due date. Late assignments will have a <u>minimum automatic 25% point deduction</u> for each day late. Do not wait until the last minute on any of your work!!

Grammar will be graded as a part of any course work. All work should be in your own words! Format – FOR ALL PAPERS: 12 point Times New Roman font, one (1) inch margins, and doubled spaced. The heading should have your names, the class and section number, and be right-justified on the page. The paper should be written in proper English and utilize APA 7th Edition citation style. Papers that do not follow this format will not be accepted or graded.

I will give feedback on assignments when appropriate, including, comments through "news items", comments directly in the discussion board, and comments to the feedback box associated with each assignment submitted to dropbox. Please take the time to read these comments as I am taking the time to make them.

Grades for each assignment will be posted in the D2L course grade book.

Quizzes

Quizzes will assess your understanding of the material presented in the textbook chapters, readings, videos, mentor presentations, etc. and are scheduled after the completion of 3 to 4 modules. Quizzes will be administered on D2L. Each quiz is timed, thus make sure you take it at a time with no distractions. You will have two attempts to complete the quizzes. Your grade will be the average of the two attempts. Time begins when you tell the program to start the clock. The average of all quizzes weighs 25%.

Assignments

There will be 4 assignments throughout the semester that conincide with module topics and class activities. Unless otherwise indicated, all assignments must be typed and submitted via the designated D2L Dropbox. More details will be shared within each assignment. The average of all assignments weighs 25%.

Class Engagement/Participation/Activities

During class you will be expected to participate in class lectures and activities (do not confuse attendance forengagement/participation).

Engagement/participation includes intelligent statements and sincere questions, and clear preparation for class. Prior to class, you will often have activities to complete so that you can effectively participate in class. These assignments are formative assessments to check students understanding of knowledge on each of the topics covered. Students are provided with different types of questions or tasks they are required to answer based on readings, in-class activities, and lectures. The average of all engagement/participation/activities weighs 10%.

Research/Creative Activity Proposal

Central to this course is to write a research/creative activity proposal. This applies <u>only</u> to non-EURECA students enrolled in MWSU 2003. EURECA students enrolled in MWSU 2003 or MWSU 4000 are working with faculty mentors on a research/creative activity project, and their grade will be based on the presentation of their project at the Undergraduate Research and Creative Activity Forum (UGRCAF) in April. In either case, this grade item weighs 40%.
