Course Description

By the end of the course, students will have developed solid competencies in each of the five goal areas (the five C's): Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities. Main objectives include:

- 1. Ability to comprehend and respond to basic conversational patterns
- 2. Proficiency and knowledge of basic grammatical structures and terminologies
- 3. Basic proficiency in reading and writing the language
- 4. Knowledge of significant cultural practices and historical events from the Spanish-speaking world
- 5. Ability to use technology for e-mail and research of selected topics in Spanish
- 6. Ability to use the VHL Central Supersite for oral and written practice of Spanish

Specific outcomes of the course are the following:

- Talk about daily routines and personal hygiene, reassure someone, tell where you went
- Talk about food, order at a restaurant, discuss familiar people and places
- Talk about celebrations and personal relationships, express congratulations, ask for the bill in a restaurant, express gratitude
- Discuss medical conditions, talk about parts of the body, talk about health and medical visits.
- Talk about using technology and electronics, talk about car trouble, use common expressions on the telephone, say how far away things are
- Welcome people, show people around the house, give instructions
- Describe and illustrate aspects of the cultures of Spanish-speaking countries and make comparisons between these cultures and their own culture(s) using basic linguistic structures and vocabulary in the target language.
- Evaluate their own values, behaviors and worldviews on the socio-cultural topics presented and compare these to those of Spanish-speakers.

If you challenge my decision, I will meet with you in person or via Zoom, and you can write a short composition in my presence to show that your use of Spanish is authentically your own. We will also have an impromptu conversation in Spanish to check your level. Please do your own work and do not cheat using others and/or artificial or technological means.

LockDown Browser and Respondus Monitoring

This course requires the use of LockDown Browser and a webcam (Respondus Monitoring) for all quizzes and exams completed in D2L. The webcam can be built into your computer or can be the type that plugs in with a USB cable. Watch this <u>short video</u> to get a basic understanding of LockDown Browser and the webcam feature. A student <u>Quick Start Guide (PDF)</u> is also available.

When taking a quiz or exam that requires LockDown Browser and a webcam, remember the following guidelines:

- Select a location where you are comfortable having a video recording taken of yourself and your workspace environment. This area should also be free of distractions and interruptions.
- Turn off all other devices (e.g., tablets, phones, second computers) and place them outside of your reach.
- Clear your desk of all external materials not permitted books, papers, other devices, etc.
- Before starting the test, know how much time is available for it, and that you've allotted sufficient time to complete it.
- Remain at your device for the duration of the test.
- If the device or networking environment is different than what was used previously with the Webcam Check and System & Network Check in LockDown Browser, run the checks again prior to starting the test.
- To produce a good webcam video, do the following:
 - Avoid wearing baseball caps or hats with brims.
 - Ensure your device is on a firm surface (a desk or table). Do NOT have the device on your lap, a bed or other surface where the device (or you) are likely to move.
 - If using a built-in webcam, avoid tilting the screen after the webcam setup is complete.
 - Take the exam in a well-lit room and avoid backlighting, such as sitting with your back to a window.
- Remember that LockDown Browser will prevent you from accessing other websites or applications; you will be unable to exit the test until all questions are completed and submitted.

No notes, textbooks, phones, translation apps, websites, AI software, friends etc. should be used on any quiz or exam in this course. Please do your own work and adhere to the MSU Student Honor Creed.

If the Respondus Monitoring system flags a quiz or exam for behavior that violates the above statement, and after review, I believe that you were cheating on the quiz or the exam, I will subtract 10 points from that quiz or exam grade for this first infraction. If another infraction or subsequent infractions occur, you will receive a grade of zero (0) for the quiz or exam in question.

VHL Homework Assignments and Tutorials

Homework assignments will be completed on the <u>VHL Central Supersite</u>. <u>Each assignment is to be</u> <u>completed by 11:59 pm on the due date</u>. Homework completed after the deadline will be accepted but with a 5% per day penalty until the day of the last assignment for that lesson. After that day, no late homework is accepted (See Calendar on <u>VHL Central Supersite</u>). The purpose of these

assignments is to help you learn the material, so you should use <u>all the VHL resources (vText,</u> vocabulary cards, etc.) to complete these "homework" type activities.

For each lesson in the <u>VHL Central Supersite</u> an average of all the homework assignments for that lesson will be recorded in the D2L course gradebook. These lesson grades contribute 15 % to your course grade. You are welcome to work ahead in the online program. Your lowest grade in this category will be dropped at the end of the semester.

The <u>VHL Central Supersite</u> also offers tutorial videos for presenting the vocabulary and grammar lessons. These will appear on the <u>VHL Central Supersite</u> and can be accessed throughout the semester either through "Activities" or in the "Calendar." Both can be found in the pulldown menu called "Assignments." Although these tutorials are not graded, I highly recommend that you view them and rewatch them if you have any trouble with the grammatical concepts being learned this semester.

Vocabulary Quizzes in D2L

You will take a vocabulary quiz for each lesson in MSU's D2L online platform (Desire-To-Learn). Please read the section on pages 4-5 of this syllabus about testing with Lockdown Browser and Respondus Monitoring. These quizzes are for checking your knowledge of the vocabulary for each lesson. They are like <u>mini exams</u> to help you with the difficult work of memorizing a great amount of vocabulary. They are to be taken <u>without</u> notes or the textbook or any other type of assistance. **No notes, textbooks, phones, translation apps, websites, AI software, friends etc. should be used. Please do your own work and adhere to the MSU Student Honor Creed.**

Please see the course calendar in this syllabus and/or on our D2L site for availability and due dates. These quizzes will contribute 10% to your course grade. No late work is accepted, and no make-up quizzes are given. Your lowest grade in this category will be dropped at the end of the semester.

Lesson Quizzes in D2L

You will take one quiz for each lesson in MSU's D2L online platform (Desire-To-Learn). Please read the section on pages 4-5 of this syllabus about testing with Lockdown Browser and Respondus Monitoring. These quizzes are to evaluate your knowledge of the vocabulary, culture and grammar concepts learned and are to be taken without notes or the textbook. They are like mini exams to help you with the difficult work of memorizing a great amount of vocabulary and grammar concepts and help you be prepared for the midterm and final exams. No notes, textbooks, phones, websites, translation apps, AI software, friends etc. should be used. Please do your own work and adhere to the MSU Student Honor Creed.

Typically, these quizzes will become available on Fridays by 5:00 pm and will be due by 11:59 pm on Sundays <u>but</u> see the course calendar in this syllabus and/or in D2L for exceptions and specific dates. These quizzes will contribute 10% to your course grade. No late work is accepted, and no make-up quizzes are given. Your lowest grade in this category will be dropped at the end of the semester.

Writing Assignments

Toward the end of each lesson, but prior to the lesson quiz, you will write a short composition related to the content and at least some of the grammar concepts presented in that lesson. Your Spanish does not have to be perfect and most likely it will not be. I expect to see mistakes. If I find

that your use of vocabulary and/or grammar concepts is more advanced that the typical Elementary Spanish II student, and there is no apparent reason for your level of expertise, you may receive a zero for that writing assignment if I am suspicious that you used an app or program to write or translate your work. If you challenge my decision, I will meet with you in person or via Zoom, and you can write a similar composition in my presence to show that your use of Spanish is authentically your own. We will also have an impromptu conversation in Spanish to check your level. Please do your own work and do not cheat by using others and/or artificial or technological means. Please do your own work and adhere to the MSU Student Honor Creed. Please see the course calendar in this syllabus and/or on our D2L site for availability and due dates. No late work is accepted but you may complete these assignments prior to the due date. These writing assignments contribute 10% to the course grade. I will drop the lowest grade from this category at the end of the semester.

Speaking Assignments

Even though this course is online, you will have to demonstrate your speaking ability by responding to some questions using "Record Video" in D2L. I encourage you to practice speaking and listening to Spanish outside of the online environment. There is a "chat" feature in the VHL Central Supersite that I have enabled so that you can talk with your classmates who are also online doing the homework. I am also available to practice speaking with you in person on campus and/or via Zoom in D2L. Please send me an email so that we can set up a time to meet. You can also practice speaking Spanish with those in your community who speak Spanish. All these opportunities will help you feel more prepared for the weekly Speaking Assignments. There are two speaking assignments per lesson for Lessons 6-8 but only one each for Lessons 9 and 10. Thus, in total, you will have 8 speaking assignments. Please see the course calendar in this syllabus and/or on our D2L site for availability and due dates. These assignments contribute 10% to your overall course grade. No late work is accepted but you may complete these assignments prior to the due date. I will drop the lowest grade from this category at the end of the semester.

LC (Listening Comprehension) Quizzes

For each lesson you will take a Listening Comprehension Quiz at the <u>VHL Central Supersite</u>, for a total of five Listening Comprehension Quizzes. You will watch the *Aventuras* video novela for each of the quizzes. These will be assigned in VHL as "Listening Comprehension," and the corresponding quiz activities will be assigned as L6, L7, L8, L9, L10, – LC Quiz. There is no Listening Comprehension Quiz for Lección 11 since we are only doing one of the grammar sections from that lesson. **These are all visible in the <u>VHL Central Supersite</u> Assignment calendar, and the due dates are listed in the course calendar in this syllabus and/or on our D2L site.** You may do them prior to the due date. No late work is accepted, and no make-up quizzes are given. Your lowest grade in this category will be dropped at the end of the semester.

Midterm Exam

The midterm exam will cover lessons 6-8 and consists of a multiple choice, matching, and/or true false part and a written/short answer part. Each part is worth approximately 50% of the exam grade. The midterm exam will be administered via D2L Assessment. Please read the section on pages 4-5 of this syllabus about testing with Lockdown Browser and Respondus Monitoring. This exam contributes 15% to the final course grade. The exam will be accessible in D2L beginning Friday, July 26, 2024, 5:00 pm and ending Sunday, July 28, 2024, 11:59 pm. Once you access the exam, you have 60 minutes to complete the exam. No notes, textbooks, phones, websites, translations apps, AI

software, friends etc. should be used. Please do your own work and adhere to the MSU Student Honor Creed.

Final Exam

The Final Exam for this course is scheduled for **Friday**, **August 8**. The Final Exam will be administered via D2L Assessment and will be accessible for a 24-hour period **beginning Thursday**, **August 8**, **2024**, **12:01 am until Thursday**, **August 8**, **2024**, **11:59 pm**.
