### **Course Goals:**

- Apply key rhetorical concepts through analyzing and composing a variety of texts
- Engage in a writing process that includes invention, drafting, collaboration, and revision
- Use reading and composing for inquiry, learning, thinking, and communicating in various rhetorical contexts
- Use strategies such as interpretation, synthesis, response, critique, and design to compose texts that integrate the writer's ideas with those from appropriate sources
- Use sources ethically and in contextually appropriate ways and follow a designated style guide
- Demonstrate proficient use of linguistic structures, including grammar and mechanics, through practice in composing and revising

**Grading Policy**: This class will not use the plus/minus grading system. In this class, the following numerical equivalents for final grades are used:

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A = 100-90%;
B = 89-80%;
C = 79-70%;
D = 69-60%;
F = 59-0
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According to MSU's Undergraduate Catalogue, "letter grades have the following significance: A indicates excellent work, B indicates good work, C indicates satisfactory work, D indicates passing work, F indicates failing work" (73). Consequently, an essay that meets the basic requirements earns a C, not an A or B. If you wish to earn As and Bs, you will have to work hard to produce better than satisfactory, or average, writing.

**IMPORTANT:** A grade of **C** or higher in ENGL 1143 is required for graduation from Midwestern State University.

**Midterm Grades:** In order to help students keep track of their progress toward course objectives, I provide a Midterm Progress Report through Navigate. I will submit a report for all students, not just those in danger of failing the course. Midterm grades are not reported on the students' transcript, nor are they calculated in the cumulative GPA. They simply give you an idea of where you stand at the midpoint of the semester. Students who are not doing satisfactory work at the midway point should make an appointment with me and consider visiting TASP.

**Submission Format and Policy:** The Proposal Paper, Annotated Bibliography, and Assimilation Paper must follow MLA style. A sample paper for each of these is included in the content of the course. The style preference includes the following:

- Header: writer's last name and page number
- Identification: writer's full name, instructor's name, course title-number-section, date
- Title: centered
- Spacing: Double-spaced throughout (extra space eliminated)
- Margins: One inch margins on top, bottom, and sides of text
- Font: Times New Roman 12

Submit these papers in the corresponding D2L drop box by its due date, 11:00 PM. Submission is <u>not</u> through email.

Type timed-writing essays into a written-response box in D2L. MLA format is not required but paragraphing is.
