Intermediate Composition & Grammar

ENGL 2113.X16 and X17, Fall 2022

Syllabus

The primary objective of the course is to develop students' skills in clear and effective composition and standard usage of the English language. In English 2113, students compose, convincingly support, and polish persuasive, thesis-driven essays. The course can be used to satisfy the Writing Proficiency Requirement.

Course goals: Students will:

- write thesis-based essays that provide strong support and specific details
- engage in a writing process that includes invention, drafting, and revision
- demonstrate critical and creative thinking about a timely issue or debatable topic
- demonstrate proficient use of Standard Written English

Prerequisites: Completion of the Communication Core

Final Exam: There is a two-part final at the semester's end (a grammar exam and an essay exam). We will use the Respondus/Lockdown browser to monitor the exam.

Required texts: A textbook is not required for this course, but a style handbook (such as the one listed below) can be helpful.

• The Little, Brown Handbook (Brief), 6th edition

Required software/hardware: A word processor (Google Docs or MSWord) that allows you to save your written assignments as Word Documents. A Chromebook is not compatible with the Respondus/Lockdown browser.

Assignments:

- Quizzes (10%): There are ten quizzes. Before taking a quiz, review all the material posted on the quiz topic in the D2L module. Quizzes must be taken during the week assigned (i.e., no make-up quizzes). If you take the quiz, you will receive a grade of "1 point," no matter your posted score on the quiz. Your final grammar exam will be based on these quizzes and will count heavily, so don't take the quizzes lightly! The week's quizzes are open 5 a.m. on Monday until 11 p.m. on the following Sunday.
- Writing assignments (50%): You have five writing assignments: a simple thesis and topic sentence assignment (W1); an assignment in which you submit two body paragraphs

(W2); and three complete essays (W3, W4, W5).

• Final exam (40%): The final exam will consist of two parts: a grammar exam (20%) and a thesis-driven essay (20%).

Late assignment policy: All assignments are due on the dates assigned. No late work will be accepted unless specific arrangements have been made prior to the due date.

Acceptable submission format and process: All formal writing assignments submitted for grading must conform to MLA guidelines. Assignments are to be submitted to the Dropbox folders in the course D2L website.
