Course Description

This course will explore and apply a variety of feminist theories and scholarly approaches to popular culture, especially using examples from Taylor Swift's oeuvre. Iterations of feminist ideologies are prevalent in contemporary popular culture, and we'll use tools from rhetorical theory to identify, analyze, evaluate, and generate cultural artifacts that engage with feminist theories. You'll practice critical reading, thoughtful interpretation and analysis, and multimodal composing as you engage with rhetayrics*.

Course Goals

Upon completing this course, students will be able to

- Analyze Swift's body of work and articulate its implications in contemporary contexts.
- Develop vocabulary to discuss feminist & social justice rhetorics in popular culture.
- Critically synthesize and apply course readings to contemporary examples and problems.
- Critically evaluate various forms of resistance & gender critique as they appear in Swift's work and popular culture more broadly, considering socio-historical contexts and identity negotiations.

At the very least, plagiarism will result in an F on the assignment; at worst, the consequence will be an F in the course. Offenders will be reported to the Chair of the Department of English, Humanities, and Philosophy and the Dean of Students. Use of AI or Writing Technologies

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The use of AI is highly discouraged in this class. Turnitin does have an AI detector, but it is not 100% accurate. Therefore, if you use AI at any stage in the writing process, you MUST state in the comment section of your submission how you used it (in detail). If an originality checker indicates that your response is more than 30% AI-generated, I will investigate further, and if your response and other evidence indicates that the work you submitted is not more than 70% original, you will not receive full credit for the assignment. Note that there is no uniform policy on AI use at MSU. Make efforts to understand the policy for each course you take.
