Course Title: Health Law in Medical Imaging

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Course Overview:

This course provides an introduction to laws affecting health care specific to medical imaging. Content includes ethical and legal principles and regulations related to the rights of patients, students, and employees.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Differentiate between administrative, civil, and statutory law
- Identify examples of administrative, civil, and statutory law for the imaging and therapeutic sciences
- Describe methods of reducing institutional and personal liability
- Apply the professional practice standards to their personal practice
- Respect the rights of the patient as described by law, professional practice standards, and ethical standards

Additional Resources:

Communication with the Instructor:

Communication will be through the student's Midwestern State University email account. An email account is created for every MSU student. If you have not accessed this account yet, please do so by logging into the Portal and clicking the student email account icon located in the Portal.

You have the option to have any messages sent here to be forwarded to the email account of your choice.

The instructor will respond or at least acknowledge email messages from students within a maximum of five (5) business days when MSU is in session. Beyond standard university holidays and breaks, the instructor will notify students of any extended periods of time when email contact is not practical (professional meetings, etc.).

Class Meeting Date and Time:

Since this is an online course, there are no mandatory face-to-face sessions. However, the student should be vigilant in logging into D2L. Regular checks will ensure messages from the instructor are received in a timely manner. This course is on a schedule that will be strictly adhered to. See the Course Schedule at the end of this syllabus for specific information about activities and due dates. The instructor will be available to meet face-to-face with any interested students. This meeting is optional and must be confirmed by email ahead of time with the instructor.

This is an online course. All notes and additional reading material (other than the textbook) will be delivered through D2L.

Student Responsibilities:

As a student enrolled in this course, you will be responsible for adhering to and meeting posted deadlines and due dates. All activities for this course are listed at the end of this syllabus.

Activities such as quizzes have expiration dates. Please take note that expiration dates for quizzes will differ from deadlines for assignments and activities.

Quizzes and assignments/activities are spaced in a manner that will allow you ample time to complete them. Assignments/activities will be accepted on or before the posted due date and deadline. **Late assignments will be accepted on a case by case basis.** If a student cannot complete a course activity by the indicated due date, the student must contact the course instructor immediately. Please note that late

submissions may not be graded unless prior approval has been granted. If a student has emergency issues, then the student must contact the instructor as soon as possible (within a day or two).

Students must use baccalaureate level writing skills including complete sentences, correct grammar, and proper punctuation. All assignments will be graded for accuracy, completeness, quality, spelling, grammar, and integrity.

All assignments will be submitted in a dropbox within D2L. All assignments will be completed in Times New Roman or Arial, 12 point font.

****All assignment submissions made by students in D2L are considered final submissions. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that the correct and complete file has been uploaded. *If a student submits an incorrect document, an incomplete draft, or any unintended version, the assignment will be graded as submitted. Students are strongly encouraged to double-check their upload before finalizing the submission.***

****Additionally, Apple file formats such as .pages or Keynote files will not be accepted. *All submissions must be uploaded in Microsoft Office formats—such as .doc, .docx, .ppt, or .xlsx—or as otherwise specified in the assignment instructions.***

Do not place ANY patient name on your assignments. Any proper name that appears on an assignment, other than yours will be considered a HIPAA violation and the assignment grade may be dropped to as low as a zero, depending on the severity of the violation.

Order of Content:

Since this course is highly interactive between students with much of the learning occurring in the discussion boards, students are required to complete the course content in the order presented in the course by the dates listed in the course schedule.

If students have technical difficulties, they should use the 'Help' link within D2L, contact the MSU Information Systems Support Staff, and send an email to the professor explaining what happened **at the time of the incident.**

All assignments must be written at the baccalaureate level and will be graded for accuracy, completeness, quality, spelling, grammar, and integrity. All assignments submitted will be considered complete and graded as such.

All assignments, exams, etc. must be completed and submitted by the due date indicated on the course schedule at the end of this syllabus. If a student cannot complete a course activity by the indicated due date, the student must contact the course instructor *immediately*. Please note that late submissions may not be graded; students must contact the instructor for approval for late submissions. D2L Module Quizzes (30%)

Students should complete the reading assignments and be familiar with the chapter objectives before attempting the module quizzes. Quiz questions will be from information learned in the modules.

When a student has reviewed a module and is ready for the quiz, they will log into D2L and receive a customized timed module quiz consisting of randomized multiple choice questions. See the course schedule at the end of this syllabus for the due dates for quizzes.

It is important to know the module content before attempting the module quizzes since the quizzes are **timed**. Quiz scores will be available immediately after a student submits for grading. Quizzes must be completed by the due dates or a zero (0) will be recorded. Students who know they will miss a due date because of extenuating circumstances should contact the instructor so their situations can be dealt with on an individual basis. Acceptance of an extenuating circumstance is at the discretion of the instructor.

If students have technical difficulties during a quiz, they should use the 'Help' link located on the top toolbar within D2L to contact the MSU Information Systems Support Staff and send an email to the course instructor immediately explaining what happened.

If a student finds a faulty quiz test item or believes a quiz question has been scored incorrectly, they should send an email to the course instructor that includes the following:

- Module quiz number (1-5)

- Question stem
- Rationale supporting why the student's answer is correct
- Include page numbers when referencing the textbook

For example, a student cannot send the message: "I think question number ten is wrong on quiz four" because each student gets a quiz of randomly generated test items. The instructor has to know the question stem to find the question in the database. After reviewing the situation, if the course instructor thinks a revision is justified, the students' quiz score will be revised to reflect the additional points and the test bank will be updated.

Discussions (20%)

Class discussions and an exchange of ideas and opinions are critical to developing an understanding of ethics, morality, and the law. Students will participate in three discussion boards based on reading assignments. The fourth discussion board will be a critique of another student's post from one of the first three discussion boards. Please read the course content for complete instructions. All discussions must be submitted by the published due date (see the course calendar). ***Because discussion boards depend upon timely student submissions, no late submissions will be accepted.***

Course Project (20%)

The course project is a narrated PowerPoint. Students will select one of the ethical dilemmas from the database on D2L and prepare a narrated PowerPoint presentation. Please read the course content for complete instructions.

Comprehensive Final Exam (30%)

The final exam is a comprehensive exam and will be administered within D2L. The final exam is timed and can only be completed once for a grade. It will only be available during the times and dates found on the course schedule.

Plagiarism will constitute in an F for the course and the student will be referred to administration for further action. When students submit their efforts for grading, they are attesting they abided by this rule.

Quizzes and exams are not to be copied in any form or shared in any form. Students caught engaging in such activity will receive an F for the course and be referred to University administration for dismissal.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) Usage Policy

In this course, the use of Generative AI tools (such as ChatGPT, Claude, Gemini, etc.) is permitted with specific limitations to ensure academic integrity and the development of critical research skills.

Research & Sourcing: You may use AI tools for preliminary research and topic exploration. However, to ensure the validity and scholarly weight of your work, at least 50% of the sources cited in any assignment must be retrieved directly from the MSU Moffett Library online databases.

Writing & Content: The use of AI in the writing process is strictly limited to spelling and grammar correction. AI tools are not permitted to generate text, arguments, analysis, or the bulk content of any assignment, including research papers, posters, and discussion board posts.

Verification: To maintain the integrity of your research, you must be prepared to provide PDF copies of all sources used upon request.

Consequences: Failure to adhere to these guidelines will be treated as a violation of academic integrity. A violation will result in a grade of zero for the assignment. Egregious cases of academic dishonesty involving AI may result in a failing grade (F) for the course.

By enrolling in this course, the student expressly grants MSU a limited right in all intellectual property created by the student for the purpose of this course. The limited right shall include but shall not be limited to the right to reproduce the students work product in order to verify originality and authenticity, and for educational purposes.

Campus Carry:
