Goals: To become knowledgeable in the application of learning principles to humans (behavioral modification).
a. I will draw additional material from Baldwin & Baldwin (2000) and Chance (2008). The material will be applied to intra- and interpersonal contexts.

a. Tests will be over approximately 7 chapters and additional material.
b. Tests will be essay and multiple choice.
c. Having to choose between the "best" and "almost best" answer.

b. Headings

d. Reference page(s).

Course Requirements: Grades will be based on your performance on 1 midterm, 1 group paper and presentation, and the final.

There will be 1 midterm and 1 final. Each exam will be worth 100 points. Tests will be multiple choice and essay. Multiple choice answers will be marked on Scantrons. Essay questions will be answered on paper I provide.

The **5-page**, APA paper will be conducted over an applied chapter in the book. The paper, PowerPoint, and presentation (20 minutes total) will be worth 100 points.

Paper

-Use a title page, headings, and reference page to organize reader

-Have four additional sources beyond the chapter. **Only one source may from .edu, .gov, or .com. All other sources should be from peer reviewed journals or academic books (not text books from other classes).**

On occasion, a group will have 1 or 2 members that perform little to none of the work. If this is the case, I am willing to intervene if the working members are willing to provide me a written complaint. I will meet with the offending student(s) and possible consequences would be: (a) offending student has to do his/her own project, (b) offending student has to meet guidelines set forth by the group, or (c) offending student receives a zero for this portion of the class. The offending student(s) does have the right to appeal the complaint, and then I will ask the entire group to meet with me to remedy the situation.

*All papers must be turned in electronically to TurnItIn.com through D2L. Go to Assessments: (a) choose Assignments, and (b) choose Group Paper. You will upload your paper and can view a similarity rating. If green (under 25% or so), no worries. If yellow, possible rewrite. Check to see if your sources are artificially raising your percent (if yes, no worries). If orange, definitely rewrite!

Student Code of Conduct:

MWSU's official policy in the University's Code of Student Conduct on page 52, states:

Instructor Drop An instructor may drop a student any time during the semester for excessive absences, for consistently failing to meet class assignments, for an indifferent attitude, or for disruptive conduct. The instructor must give the student a verbal or written warning prior to dropping the student from the class. An instructor's drop of a student takes precedence over the student initiated course drop of a later date. The instructor will assign a grade of either WF or F through the first 9 weeks of a long semester, the first 6 weeks of a 10 week summer term, or the 12th class day of a 4 or 5 week summer term consisting of 20 days. After these periods the grade will be an F. The date the instructor drop form is received in the Office of the Registrar as the official drop date. A student dropped from a class by a faculty member for disruptive behavior has the right of appeal to the Student Conduct Committee through the Student Conduct office.

I will closely follow this policy in terms of your conduct in class. Anything that is disruptive to the class will result in you being Instructor Dropped from the class with a grade of F. I will enforce this policy in that my obligation is to provide the best and most informative course that I can. I cannot do that when there is behavior that disrupts the class. This also includes attempting to dominate or "teach" the class, interrupting the course frequently with stories that are not facilitative or relevant to the flow of the class, using electronics during class that are not directly related to the class material, and talking frequently to one's peers while course is being held. Any other behaviors that are deemed disruptive will also be enforced as deemed by our Code of Conduct policy. Remember that there are stories and questions that are facilitative to our class discussions, and some that are obstructive.
