Course Objectives

By the end of the semester, the student should be able to do the following:

• Comprehend important developments in Western drama that have occurred since the mid-20th century (SLO: Knowledge of development of theatre).

- Experience a number of plays that illustrate these developments and to analyze these plays both orally and in writing (SLO: Knowledge of development of theatre).
- Articulate the impact of important writers and other theatrical personages who have shaped the contemporary theatre (SLO: Knowledge of development of theatre).
- Write a theatrical research paper and summarize it to give a presentation

Requirements

Enrollment a course that uses D2L: In order to effectively take an online course, you will need the following.

- A stable internet connection
- Access to a computer
- Access to D2L
- The ability to use Respondus during the midterm and final exams.

Zoom meetings: I'm more than happy to zoom with you. If you do zoom with me, I have the following requirements.

- Have a working video camera
- Have a stable internet connection
- Have a working microphone
- Have a quiet space in which to zoom (I will end the zoom if you are at work or driving a vehicle).
- Have high visibility lighting (ring light is ideal)

If the university moves to all online classes, a new schedule will be developed. The grading will be adjusted if needed.

Details regarding grading

Quizzes: Quizzes will be given most weeks (see schedule for details). Quizzes are each worth 10 points. The professor sees quizzes as an opportunity to learn, NOT as a penalty for not knowing the information. With that in mind, students will be allowed an infinite number of attempts. The

professor encourages the student to take the quiz until the full 10 points are achieved. Quizzes will be objective and contain 10 questions. The questions will be randomly pulled from a pool of questions, so each attempt may be different. Quizzes will open Mondays at 12:01 am and close Sundays at 11:59 pm.

Midterm & Final exam: These tests will require the student to use Respondus so if you have difficulty running Respondus on your computer, you may need to use a university computer rather than your own. There will be a time limit on the objective portion of the exam. The essay questions will be distributed in class as part of the review and will be due at the end of the exam time.

Mental and Physical Health

If you are ill and unable to complete the work within the timeframe allowed, it is your responsibility to speak with the professor. Don't just email or text. Be sure to speak with the professor so we can figure out how to address the class schedule in a manageable way. We are living in a world with increasing stress which is challenging for everyone. If you are sick, you have access to medical care on campus at the Vinson Health Center (<u>https://www.msutexas.edu/healthcenter/services</u>). There is no charge for a doctor's appointment but there are minimal costs for lab work, x-rays, etc. Prescriptions written there can be filled at any pharmacy in Texas. MSU has a contractual agreement with Trott's Drug (<u>https://www.trottsdrug.com/</u>) to provide prescribed medications at a discounted rate for enrolled MSU students.

Infection/Illness Control

Even the best and most careful of us get sick. In order not to infect others, the professor asks you to zoom in to class if you are sick.
