Homework

Students will need a Pinterest account. For each production, students will put together a Pinterest board for that production. The professor should be invited to share the board. A minimum of 20 pictures for each character should be on the board. No more than 25% of the board may be the same as other boards. In other words, each student should do their own research, not count on others to do the search for them. An add-on is available for free that will allow the individual to pin any picture on the web and students may find it useful to download this add-on.

Quizzes

Quizzes will be posted on D2L. Students will have the opportunity to retake the quiz as many times as desired during the 48 hours that the quizzes are available. Quizzes may not be made up.

Projects Required

The class projects will be reviewed in class and detailed instructions will be posted on D2L.

Final Exam

The final exam for this course will be a presentation of the final design projects. The design website (detailed instructions will be posted on D2L) is also due at the same time.

Change of Schedule

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

Refund and Repayment Policy

A student who withdraws or is administratively withdrawn from Midwestern State University (MSU) may be eligible to receive a refund for all or a portion of the tuition, fees and room/board charges that were paid to MSU for the semester. HOWEVER, if the student received financial aid (federal/state/institutional grants, loans and/or scholarships), all or a portion of the refund may be returned to the financial aid programs. Instructor Class Policies

I have zero tolerance for plagiarism. Plagiarism, the presentation of another's thoughts as one's own, is one of the most serious offenses possible in higher education and the arts. Don't do it! Cases of plagiarism will be dealt with as explained in the MSU Student Handbook. Expect there to be serious repercussions to plagiarism.

Cell phone use in class is prohibited unless instructed by the professor to

use it. If your cell phone goes off during a class you may be asked to leave the classroom and receive an absence for the day. No texting. Again, you may be asked to leave the classroom. Please don't make this an issue, just turn off the phone during our class. If other commitments are so pressing that they cannot wait until the end of the class session, it may be in the student's best interests to reconsider the priority placed on being this class. In any case, the professor reserves the right to ask you to leave immediately or to embarrass you mercilessly if your phone/pager/beeper/ etc. makes noise during class.

Changes in the course syllabus, procedure, assignments, and schedule may be made at the discretion of the instructor.

In this class, we will be read, discussing and responding to a variety of scripts. It is the hope of the professor that each student will carefully consider the playscript before discussing said material in class. In a university environment, an environment in which all are encouraged to grow and develop to their ultimate potential, it is not beneficial to make comments that are derogatory to an individual or group of people because of their race, ethnicity, religion, age, gender or sexual orientation.

Social justice is one of MSU's stated core values, and the professor considers the classroom to be a place where students will be treated with respect as human beings, regardless of gender, race, ethnicity, national origin, religious affiliation, sexual orientation, political beliefs, age or ability. It is the professor's expectation that ALL students be able to consider the classroom a safe environment. Be civil at all times and focus on understanding the material being discussed.

How To Succeed in This Class

Do your reading assignments on or before the in-class discussion. Some days you will read a lot, some none. Stay on top of it as the professor will not repeat what is in the text.

Be realistic about how long it takes you to read and comprehend material. Some people take longer than others. Some people need to read the material several times. If the professor suspects that assigned readings are not being completed, pop quizzes will be given in class.

Stay on top of your assignments, drawing or otherwise. Most days you will have some assignment. I will be checking every day to be sure you are keeping up with the work. If you don't do the work, you can't grow as an artist.

Covid-19 Concerns

Live performance is shifting during this time, and as a department we found new methods to allow our students to create live art through different types of productions/performances. Should Covid 19 restrictions be reinstated, students will be notified of any changes.

Should the course need to move online, the quizzes will continue and projects that can be completed at a distance will be developed.

Scientific data shows that, in all age groups, being fully vaccinated is the most effective way to prevent and slow the spread of Covid-19 and has the greatest probability of avoiding serious illness if infected with Covid 19. Although MSU Texas is not mandating vaccination in compliance with Governor Abbott's executive orders, we highly encourage eligible members of our community to get a vaccination. If you have questions or concerns about the vaccine, please contact your primary care physician or health care professional. Given the recent rise in cases, individuals are also strongly encouraged to wear facial coverings when indoors among groups of people, regardless of vaccination status. Although MSU Texas is not currently requiring facial coverings, they have been an effective strategy in slowing the spread.
