Essentials of Argument (EOA): Chapter 4

Read the chapter. Make yourself familiar with the writing process and begin practicing its steps if you are not already doing so.

- Research: Begin research for your Exploratory Paper. Read the Exploratory Paper Instructions under Assessments, Assignments or on the calendar in D2L. An Exploratory Paper Sample is in the Week 3 content of this course. As a girl, Prisna Virasin loved Barbie. Then as a college student, she may have googled "What's the controversy about Barbie dolls?" and found an issue for research. Just google "controversy" about your topic. Don't make up ideas. Don't just write, "Some say." That type of writing creates a poor paper. Do some online research. Who is talking about your topic? And more importantly, what are they arguing about? That's where you'll find an issue. You need 3 perspectives, not just 1 for and 1 against. If you choose, you may begin academic research in Google Scholar and MSU's library databases, but neither is required for this assignment.
- *Plan*: Do not begin arguing and supporting your position with sources. (You'll support a position in your Research Paper.) The Exploratory Paper is a presentation of people and their positions on the issue. You are sitting at a table with 3 people, and everyone is allowed to give his or her opinion about the issue without interruption or argument. You speak last.
- *Cite*: Every source you use must be cited in 2 places: in the text and on the Works Cited page. Study the <u>Exploratory Paper Sample</u>. It contains quotations, a paraphrase, and their Works Cited entries.
 - EOA has MLA citation guidelines beginning on page 259.
 - Learn how to cite in an MLA webinar. <u>Access the webinar here</u>. (Fill out the registration. The MLA Organization is just counting the number of participants. Watching the question and answer portion of the webinar is your choice.)
 - The best quick online reference for citation is Purdue Owl MLA Guide.
 - For the purposes of this class, end each Works Cited page citation with an access date—
 the day you initially find the source online.
