Lecture Exams

You **MUST** present a valid university excuse to me and/or make arrangements with me **BEFORE** an exam is missed in order to be able to make up a missed lecture exam. If a make-up exam is granted, it should be taken immediately (i.e. before exam results are revealed to the class). **DO NOT MISS AN EXAM!!!!** Academic honesty must be practiced at all times.

Attendance

Your attendance will be documented. You are expected to attend all classes of face-to-face instruction unless you are in isolation or guarantine for COVID-19 (in which case, University officials should notify me of this reason for your absence from the classroom) or for other University-excused absences. Virtual attendance via ZOOM will not be an option to rectify these absences since this is entirely a traditional face-to-face course. A lot of material is presented in each class period, which makes it easy to fall behind if a class is missed. If you miss a class, it is **YOUR** responsibility to get class notes from classmates or any handouts from your instructor. Students with excessive absences may be dropped from the course. If you are required to isolate or quarantine for COVID-19, please contact me to discuss options for keeping up with course content while you are required to be away from the classroom. MSU Texas COVID-19 Policies for Students

Although COVID-19 vaccinations are not mandated, MSU Texas is strongly recommending that all students be vaccinated for COVID-19. The vaccines are safe and effective and will protect the student and other members of the MSU Texas community. Masks will not be required for either indoor or outdoor activities on campus, however, all visitors to the Vinson Health Center will be required to wear a mask. The wearing of masks while in public indoor settings and frequently washing your hands has proven to be effective at preventing the spread of COVID-19. Accordingly, we strongly recommend wearing masks when around others in indoor settings. **Fully vaccinated students** who are not experiencing symptoms will NOT be required to quarantine or seek testing following an exposure to a COVID-19 positive person, including roommates. Following a known exposure, students should monitor for symptoms over the course of 14 days and guarantine if symptoms develop. Unvaccinated **students** who have been identified as having a known exposure to a COVID-19 positive person will be required to quarantine for a minimum of 10 days or longer depending upon testing and degree of contact. If a student is unvaccinated and can prove a COVID-19 diagnosis and recovery in the last 90 days and is symptom free, guarantine will not be required. Self-isolation will be required for all students (vaccinated or unvaccinated) who test positive for

COVID-19. Students who live in university housing will be provided with a location to complete the self-isolation period.

Any student (vaccinated or unvaccinated) who has a laboratory confirmed case of COVID-19 must complete the COVID-19 Reporting Form for Students.

Wichita County Public Health District Quarantine Procedures

Some COVID-19 related questions and answers from the Dean of the McCoy College of Science, Mathematics, and Engineering Q. Is the two-week quarantine for people testing positive or exposed to a person who tested positive still in effect? Yes. Unvaccinated students, faculty, and staff must quarantine for two weeks after exposure to a COVID-positive individual. COVID-positive students, faculty, and staff must be in isolation for two weeks (or until the county releases them back to normal activities.) The notification process for COVID positive tests or exposure is still in effect. - **Q.** How are absences during COVID quarantine or isolation counted? Quarantine/isolation counts as an absence for students. There is no automatic streaming or hybrid delivery of courses.
- **Q. If a student accrues too many absences, do standard university policies still apply?** Yes. A faculty member may do an instructor drop for students accruing too many absences.

MAKE SURE YOU READ YOUR TEXTBOOK! Most of the material for exams will be derived from the textbook and notes. Read the chapter(s) assigned for each class period. Lectures should correspond to the chapters indicated on your syllabus. Take thorough lecture notes to make sure you get material covered in lecture that is not in the text.

Class Policies

Class Prerequisite: BIOL 2114 with a grade of C or better.

Class Requirements: This class contains both a lecture and separate lab component to it. You must be registered in both the lecture and lab and attend both.

Change of Schedule

A student dropping a course (but not withdrawing from the University) within the first 12 class days of a regular semester or the first four class days of a summer semester is eligible for a 100% refund of applicable tuition and fees. Dates are published in the Schedule of Classes each semester.

Refund and Repayment Policy

A student who withdraws or is administratively withdrawn from Midwestern State University (MSU) may be eligible to receive a refund for all or a portion of the tuition, fees and room/board charges that were paid to MSU for the semester. HOWEVER, if the student received financial aid (federal/state/institutional grants, loans and/or scholarships), all or a portion of the refund may be returned to the financial aid programs. As described below, two formulas (federal and state) exists in determining the amount of the refund. (Examples of each refund calculation will be made available upon request).
