Homework

Homework will consist of the following: chapter readings, questionnaires, quizzes and other assignments that could not be finished during class hours. Please keep up with D2L and daily announcements in class for the updates on out of class work.

Quizzes

Students will have three quizzes in this course. These quizzes are located on D2L and will be completed outside of class. Quizzes are multiple choice prompts, short answers, or sketching over the chapter readings. These quizzes are open book, open note and students are allowed 3 attempts. The highest score will be the one used for the final quiz grade. Please go to D2L for further quiz description and due dates.

Projects Required

Studio projects and exercises: 6 major projects along with smaller exercises will be completed over the semester. Some research and sketches will be required as well for each project and will have specific due dates.

Extra Credit

Extra credit is not given in this course.

Late Work

All work must be turned in on time. D2L will have the open dates, due dates, and end dates for all student work.

For questionnaires, quizzes, and artist discussions that are turned in late (after due date), it is deducted 50% for everyday it is late. Once the online work has been closed (end date), it can only be reopened if students email instructor a request and a valid reason for missing the work (situations out of student control) and will only be for partial credit. Discussions cannot be reopened, but can be submitted via email, with an additional deduction for missing responses. Instructor will use discretion on opening closed student work and will discuss this as a case-by-case basis for each student request. If requests are repeated and continual, students maybe advised to drop course.

Projects and in-class exercises must be completed within the time period allotted. Projects must be ready for installation before critique. Late projects and in-class exercises will have a 25% deduction per day late. If project and in-class exercises are late, only with permission can it be worked on during next class sessions.

Desire-to-Learn (D2L)

Extensive use of the MSU D2L program is a part of this course. Each student is expected to be familiar with this program as it provides a primary source of communication regarding assignments, examination materials, and general course information. Attendance

Students are expected to attend all meetings of the classes in which they are enrolled. Although in general students are graded on intellectual effort and performance rather than attendance, absences may lower the student’s grade where class attendance and class participation are deemed essential by the faculty member. In those classes where attendance is considered as part of the grade, the instructor should so inform students of the specifics in writing at the beginning of the semester in a syllabus or separate attendance policy statement. An instructor who has an attendance policy must keep records on a daily basis. The instructor must give the student a verbal or written warning prior to being dropped from the class. Instructor’s records will stand as evidence of absences. A student with excessive absences may be dropped from a course by the instructor. Any individual faculty member or college has the

authority to establish an attendance policy, providing the policy is in accordance with the General University Policies.

Students enrolled in the Juanita and Ralph Harvey School of Visual Arts must comply with the following department-wide attendance, absence and lateness policy:

1. Students arriving ten minutes after class begins (or leave early) will be considered late and will be counted absent.
2. THREE late arrivals (or early leave) count as a single absence.
3. Students may be absent from class THREE times without penalty and without providing any documentation regarding the absence.
4. If students incur a FOURTH absences, their final course grade will be reduced by a full letter grade.
5. If students are absent or late FIVE times, whatever the reason, they will receive a failing grade, can be dropped from the class roll, and be asked to stop attended class.

Students must be on time in the class and prepared with the proper materials or will be considered absent.

Cell phones, laptops, and headphones/media sets must be off or silent. Only use during class breaks or when necessary for coursework.

Students must respect each other, the staff and faculty, by not causing distractions in the classroom. If the disruptions are problematic, they are to be addressed by either intervening or asking the student to leave (this will be counted as an absence).

Critiques are mandatory. Only finished projects will be in critique but all students (even with unfinished work) must participate in critique. Missing a critique will cause a 25% deduction in project.

Regular online activity is required. Students must contact the instructor as soon as possible if there are any emergencies or issues that will influence class performance. Please follow [Student Handbook](#) guidelines to follow appropriate measures.

An instructor may send Early Alerts through D2L to a student and their advisor about the following issues: student absent for more than three days in class, student offline for more than 5 days in a row, missing assignments or lack of progression and communication, not obtaining or using class materials, behavioral issues, or plagiarism. If 3 Early Alerts are sent, and no student progression is made, Instructor will perform an Instructor Withdrawal to drop the student from the course.

Faculty members have the discretion to make exceptions to this policy based on individual circumstances.

Change of Schedule
