Course Description

This course examines the multiple roles of the nurse in advanced practice and the integration of these roles into practice settings. We will explore the process of resource utilization in relation to health care management, health promotion, and cost-effectiveness. Business, legal aspects, and EBP (evidenced-based practice) will be taught throughout the course.

Pre-requisites: Theoretical Foundations in Nursing, Course number 5103, and/or the consent of the Graduate Coordinator. This course requires 3 classroom hours per credit hour weekly.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of this course, the student should be able to:

1. Evaluate the roles of the nurse in advanced practice (e.g.) clinician, researcher, educator, and consultant in providing care for individuals, families, and groups in a variety of settings.
2. Examine the evolution of advanced practice roles within the nursing profession and the health care system.
3. Examine legal parameters that govern advanced nursing practice.
4. Examine the multiple factors influencing the health care of culturally diverse and underserved populations.
5. Apply theory and research from various disciplines to design health systems for individuals, families, and groups.
6. Participate with other disciplines in planning and formulating health care programs and policies.
