Course Goals

Given the limits on our available time, we will read and discuss a series of *representative* texts while we attempt to understand more fully the intellectual environments associated with British Romanticism, Victorianism, Modernism . . . and a few later developments.

Final grades in the class will be created from two sources:

- 1) Three exams will require answering brief questions regarding lecture and the assigned readings. We will discuss the format and scoring procedures before the first exam. The exam average will create 70% of the final grade.
- 2) Secondly, everyone will turn in two primary-source essays reacting to the materials we have studied. The essay average will be worth 30% of the final grade. Please start drafting early and ask for help.

Grading Policy

The final class mark will be based on the total points earned: A = 100 to 90 points total; B = 89 to 80; C = 79 to 70; D = 69 to 60; F = 59 to 0.

Final Examination

We will write only three unit exams.

Submission and Format Policy

Typed, written work will be submitted in MLA format. Essays submitted in other formats will not be evaluated.

Note: At term's end, such a discussion is not always possible—we will lack the time; the zero will stand. The improper citation of class texts will affect the grade earned by submitted essays.
