PREREQUISITES: Undergraduate statistics course

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course prepares students to critique research literature for appropriateness and utilization in nursing practice. Emphasis is placed on increasing knowledge and skills related to the development and evaluation of research proposals. Both quantitative and qualitative methodologies are explored.

CREDIT HOUR ALLOCATION: 3 semester hours (3 classroom and 0 clinical clock hours)

SUBMISSION OF ASSIGNMENTS:

Save all documents as a Microsoft Word document (.doc or .docx) and save as (Your LAST Name and name of assignment) Example: SMITH. Levels of Evidence Project

Timely submission of all assignments is required. In the event a student needs an extension due to compelling circumstances, communicate with faculty in advance of the due date. Late assignments will ONLY be accepted in compelling or emergent circumstances. Students requesting an extension will be required to submit work completed to-date, so faculty can see that effort was made to complete the assignment and that the emergency is not poor planning. Initial Post:

The Literature Synthesis paper in Module V, which counts for 20% of the course grade is first placed, as a DRAFT on the Discussion Board, so that peer reviewers have access as well as placing a copy in the appropriate Dropbox for faculty access.

Response Post:

Peer Reviewers are expected to review the draft within five (5) business days of the initial post due date, to allow students time to make edits before submitting the final paper to Dropbox. Please place your input directly on the peer's draft paper, using the track changes feature in your word processing program. Please review the grading rubric for the Literature Synthesis (to guide your feedback) before responding to your classmates.

Please save all of your work, in case D2L or the internet crash, so that you do not lose your work.

MODULE QUIZZES:

All Module Quizzes are opened at 8:00 AM at the beginning of the module and closed at 11:00 PM on the date indicated on the class calendar. Students may take a Module Quiz as many times as they wish during the open period. Following each attempt, students will be provided with a score, but students are not provided correct answers. The purpose of this approach is to facilitate deeper exploration of the content until students reach their best understanding. Students are welcome to collaborate with each other on quizzes. The highest score achieved on any attempt is the score for that quiz. Failure to complete the quiz by 11:00 PM on the closing date will result in a grade of zero for the quiz. Quizzes will NOT be reopened to allow late submission, so please plan accordingly.
